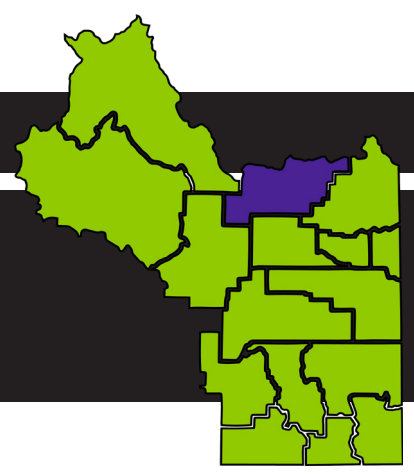

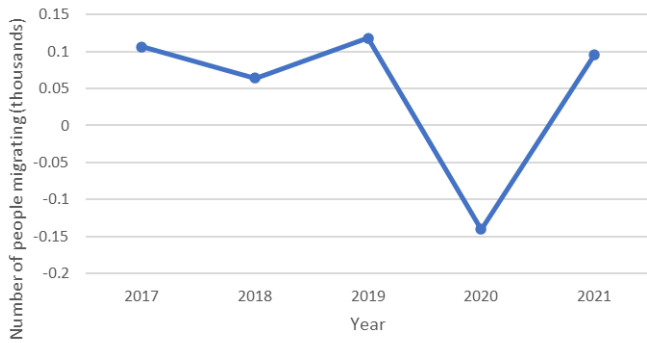

In 2017, 9 people moved to Clark County. Since 2017, the average number of lost residents was over 15 per year.

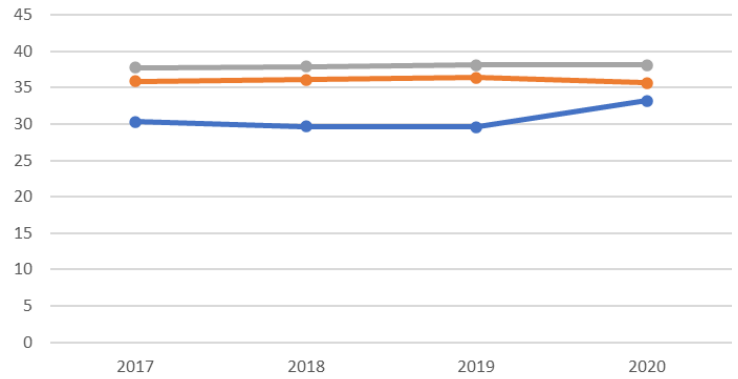

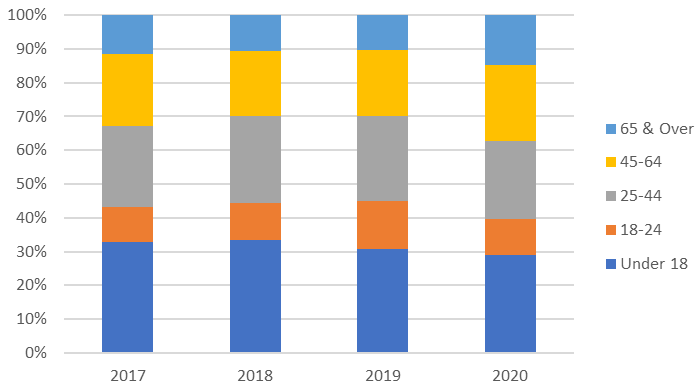

### Age Distribution



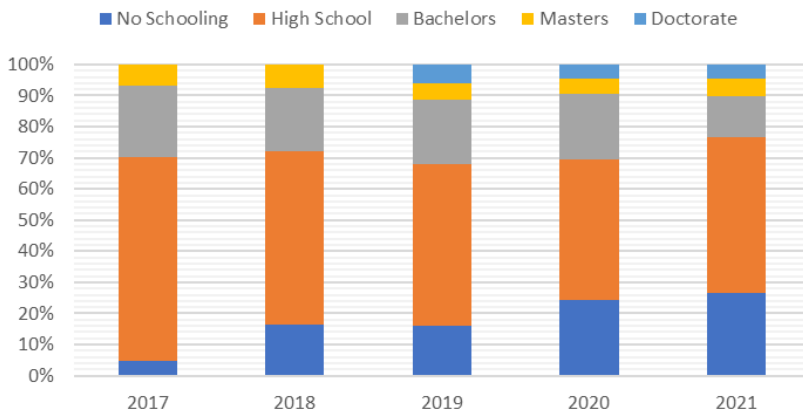
### AGE DISTRIBUTION

The age distribution in Clark County is fairly even throughout all age ranges. Clark County's population is older than most of Eastern Idaho.

Since 2017, the population of those 18-44 decreased by 0.8% and those who are 65+ increased by 3.2% suggesting that Clark County's population is aging.

## EDUCATION

As of 2021, 23% of the population over 25 had a college degree.

From 2017 to 2021, the percentage of people with an advanced degree grew from 6.4% to 9.9%.

While the population without a high school diploma or only a high school diploma was 70% in 2017, compared to 76.6% in 2021. The percentage is increasing showing no shift towards higher education in the county.

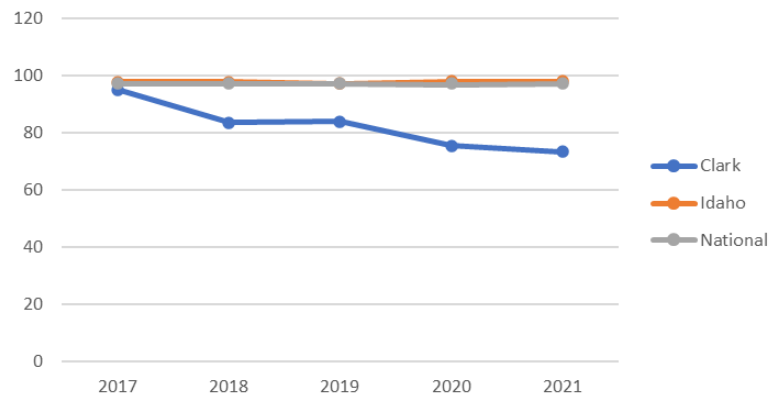
## HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION RATES

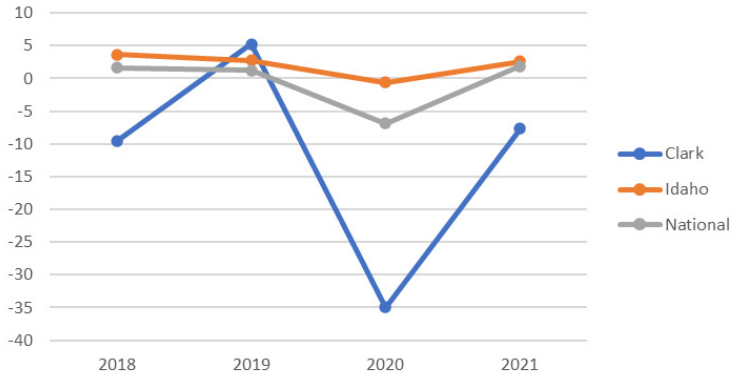
## High School Graduation Rate

## JOB GROWTH

Job growth has been sporadic in Clark County since 2017, the economy has lost 54 jobs. The largest swing (negative 35%) was the loss of 42 jobs in 2019. The average job growth rate over 4 years was a -11.7% or an average loss of 13 jobs per year. In March of 2021, 138 positions were filled in the Clark County labor market.

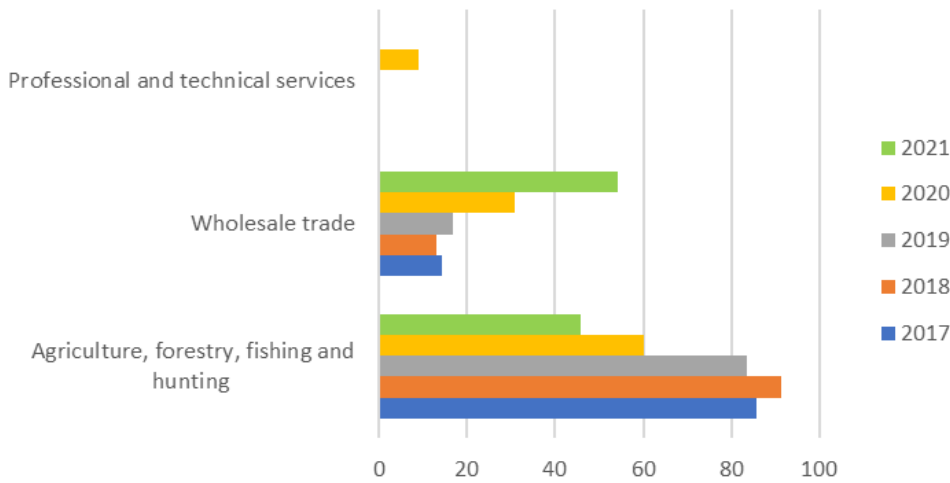

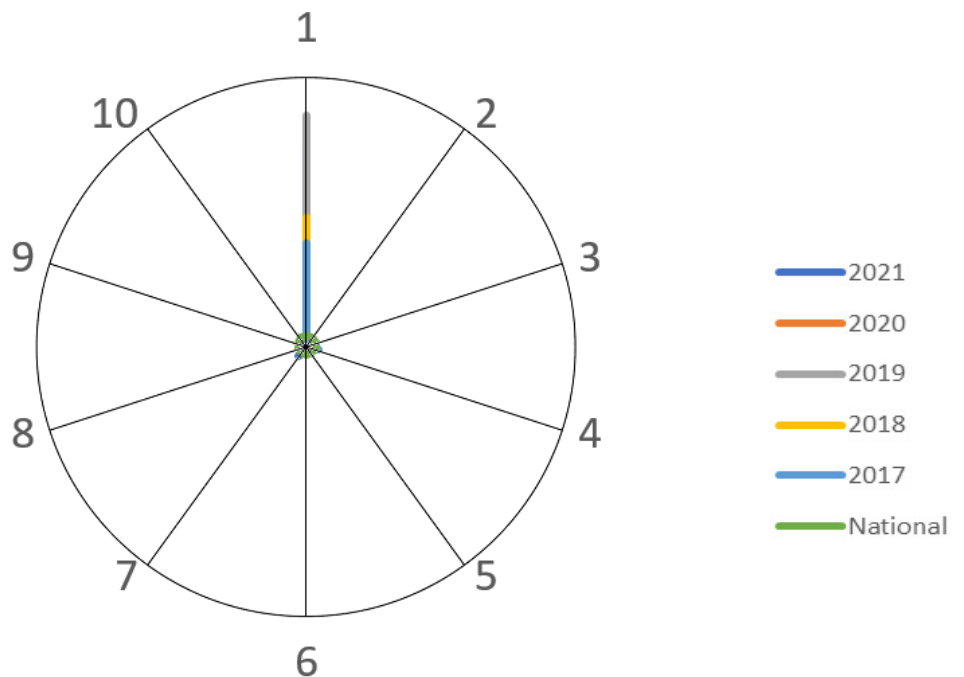
## EMPLOYMENT BY SECTOR

Each sector is represented by its share of total employment for each given year. The Wholesale Trade sector has been declining in terms of share of total employment.

The following represents sectors growing within Clark County: Professional and Technical services, Agriculture, Forestry, Fishing and Hunting. The Agriculture, Forestry, Fishing and Hunting sectors are the largest in the county employing 118 people or 85.71% of the workforce as of 2021.

## LOCATION QUOTIENT

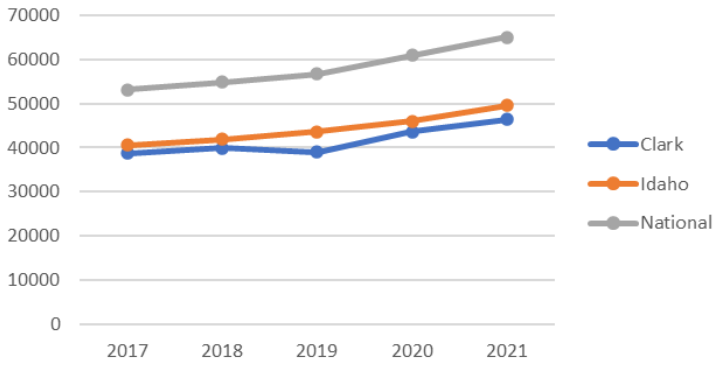
Location quotient represents the share of an industries need for employees in an area compared to its national average. For example, Clark County's Natural Resources and Mining Industry has a location quotient of 11.08 meaning it employs more than eleven times the national average within the industry. In contrast, the location quotient for the Professional and Business Services Industry has fallen to 0.18 meaning Clark County's share of employment in the industry is 18% of the national average.

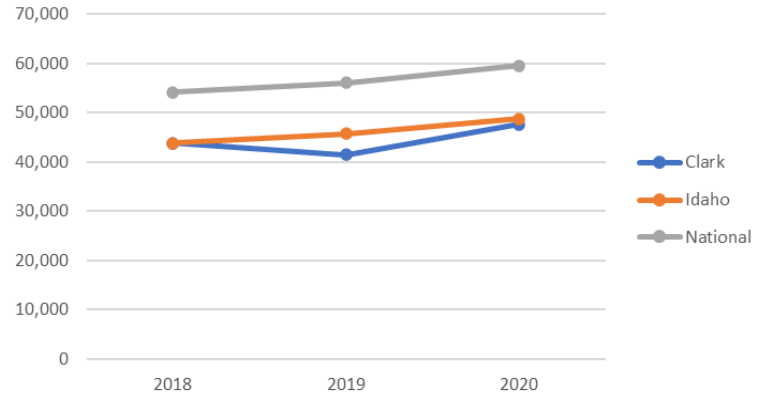

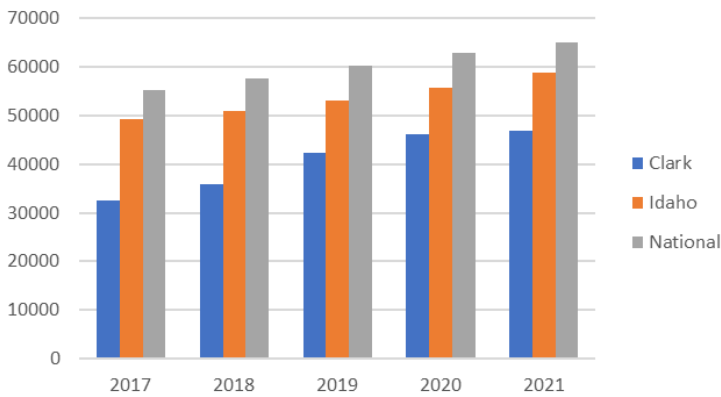

### Median Household Income

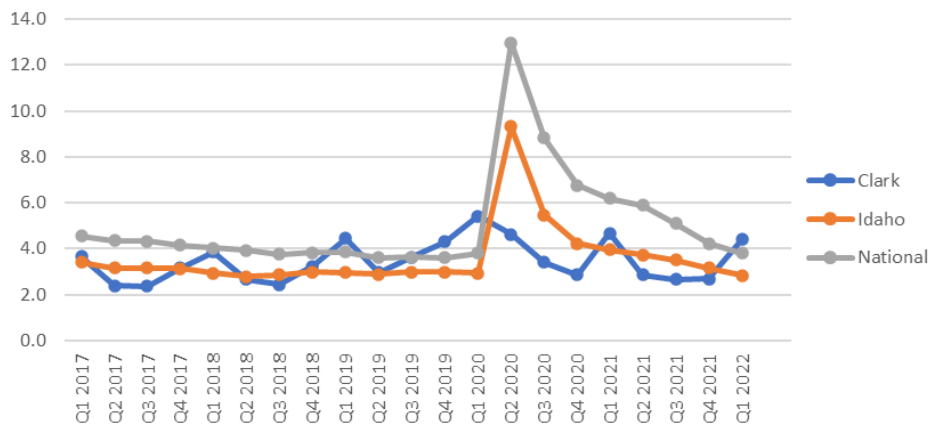

Median household income has risen across the nation since 2017. Households in Clark County are earning 44.74% more than they did in 2017. Median household income was \$46,929 in 2021.

### UNEMPLOYMENT RATE

Unemployment spiked in the nation in early 2020. Clark County's unemployment peaked in March 2020, at 5.3% then two months later in May unemployment fell below 5% returning the county to full employment. Unemployment is now below pre-lockdown levels and is currently 4.7%.

## POVERTY

The poverty rate in Clark County has fallen from 27.1% in 2017, to 9.8 % in 2021. Poverty has been decreasing since 2014, when it peaked at 27.8%.

## COST OF LIVING

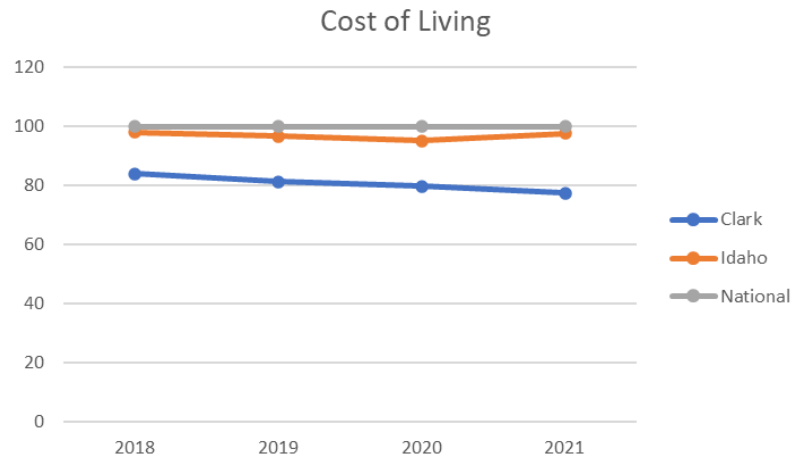
Cost of living is decreasing in Clark County. In 2021, the cost of living was 77.4 meaning when the average American spends \$100 on normal goods while those in Clark County only spent \$77.40. One of the main drivers for the low cost of living is the abundance of wind and hydroelectric generation helping to bring down utility costs.

## MEDIAN HOME VALUE

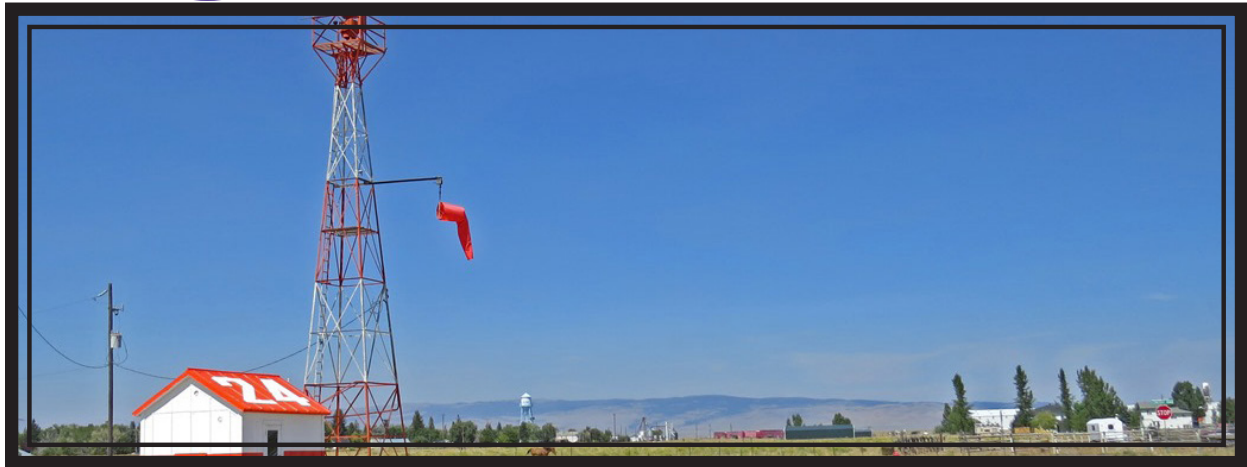
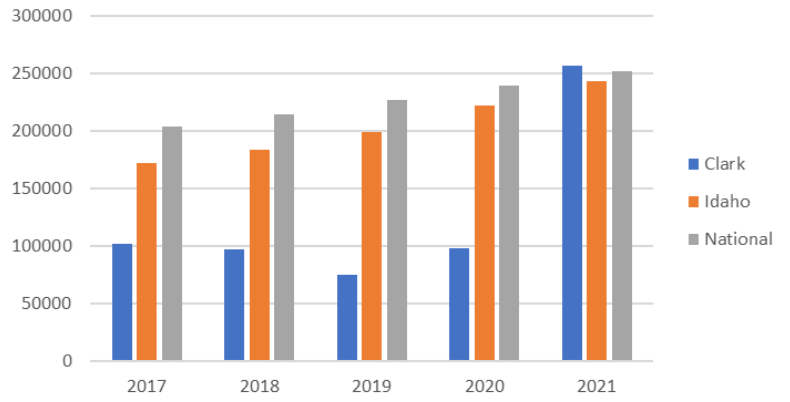

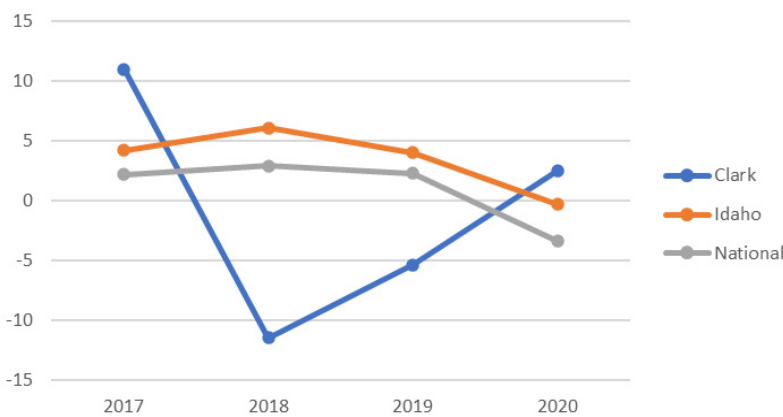

## GROSS DOMESTIC PRODUCT

Clark County's Gross Domestic Product rose at a rate of 2.5% in 2020. The total GDP of Clark County was \$47.3 million in 2020. This accounts for 0.06% of the state's GDP and 0.311% of the GDP within Eastern Idaho.
